Thanks to everyone who took the time to reflect and to put those reflections down on paper, here they are. Hopefully they give some sense of the events of last weekend and encourage your own reflection.

On Sunday August 26<sup>th</sup> I attended the papal mass in the Phoenix Park, A truly memorable event that was very well organised meaning that people could navigate their way to and from the park to the bus parks with ease. Roadways through the sections meant that everyone in the crowd could see the pope as he passed through. The mass itself was beautiful and

encompassed our own native Irish in prayers, readings, responses and song, making the mass very much Irish. It also hosted readings and prayers in a range of different languages to cater for the diversity of the crowd. A

wonderful, peaceful and uplifting atmosphere was present throughout as hundreds of thousands were unified in their participation in the mass. In all, it

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Trying to track the Pope mobile above the heads of thousands while running through the corrals in an effort to get closer to Pope Francis was difficult but I was rewarded when he headed our way. 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The rain failed to dampen the spirits of 45,000 pilgrims who made their way to Knock Shrine in the early hours of Sunday morning.

The magnificent parish choir and musicians set the scene prior to the Pope's arrival. Cheering and applause erupted when the Pontiff arrived. Stepping into the Pope mobile he travelled through the crowd looking happy and relaxed. A very poignant moment was when Pope Francis entered the Apparition Chapel and prayed in silence for 10 minutes. A total silence fell on the crowd giving each of us an opportunity to reflect and pray. In his address to the people the Holy Father spoke with humility and compassion before ending with the Angelus. As he departed, the choir, along with all those present sang the beautiful "Our Lady of Knock." Being "in this moment" for one hour with the Pope was a truly moving and emotional occasion. Joan

A shuttle bus brought myself and others to the Phoenix Park around 6am and we all gathered in a tent, soaked to the skin, not knowing how the day was going to go. Would people turn up? As the rain continued to bucket down, I along with 3 other volunteers was stationed in the blue zone, directly in line with the papal cross. I had stood in wet clothes for over three hours and the park still seemed empty.

The clouds cleared, the rain stopped, and people began slowly arriving. With the poor weather conditions and negative media coverage, I was unsure at how the mass would go.

Soon thousands of people were walking in all around me and I was giving directions and checking tickets.

There was a good atmosphere as people from all walks of life filtered into the park. An aerial view of the park was shown on the large screen, I saw that over 300,000 people had arrived to see the Pope.

I continued to help and give instructions as hundreds came to me with enquiries.

The Pope arrived and the crowds began sprinting (we weren't given instructions to stop them so I remained in-situ).

As the mass began I could sense that I was part of something historic in our country's history.

When the day ended, despite being soaked to the skin, I felt that enduring the harsh weather was all worth it as I contributed to a great event, which will be remembered well into the future.
