THE SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION 2020

What a wonderfully busy week in our parishes. We welcomed Bishop Eamonn
Walsh to this part of the Diocese on three occasions this week to
celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation.

Bishop Eamonn brought his usual, friendly, accessible and easy to listen to style to the celebrations and there was more than one outbreak of spontaneous laughter.

He began by setting the scene for everyone present and spoke to us briefly about something Gandhi once said, which he then issued as a challenge to the young people being confirmed. Bishop Eamonn said: Gandhi said "if you Christians took your Christ seriously then the whole world would be Christian." He challenged the young people to make this a reality. He pointed out that for too long the Church had focused on rules and "made nearly everything a sin". He then issued a second challenge; "to be your best self." He said that the secret to happiness is to be happy with yourself just as you are. You are made to measure and do not need to change. He encouraged us to put on God's glasses. To emphasise this point he even, briefly, swapped glasses with either one of the candidates or one of the altar servers.

To see ourselves and others as God sees, he told us to use the 'God Filter'. Just as we might use a 'filter' to alter a photograph, so too we should use the God filter to alter how we see the world. #God Filter was inscribed on a wrist band that the Bishop gave to each of the newly confirmed, reminding them to look at people as God looks. To use the gifts of the Holy Spirit as a help 'to be your best you.' Although Bishop Eamonn is retired we sincerely hope that it will not be the last time we welcome him to our parishes to celebrate the sacraments with us.

ECUMENICAL PRAYER SERVICE AT ST PATRICK'S WELL GLASSELY

COVID 19 - HSE ADVICE.

Please be advised that in order to prevent the spread of Covid 19 (Coronavirus) the following measures are in place:

There will be no shaking hands at the sign of peace.

Please only receive Holy Communion on the hand and not on the tongue.

Also avoid using Holy Water fonts. This is the advice that we have at the moment and may change as this illness develops.

<u>Most importantly</u> please pray for protection during this time. Psalm 91 is a Psalm of protection and a relevant section of the Psalm is given below.

Follow this advice from the HSE to protect yourself and others from coronavirus.

- Wash your hands properly and often
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue or your sleeve when you cough and sneeze.
- Put used tissues into a bin and wash your hands.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.
- Try to avoid close contact with people who are not well.
- Follow the travel advice from the Department of Foreign Affairs

Don's

- Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth if your hands are not clean.
- Wash your hands
- You should wash your hands:
 - ♦ after coughing or sneezing
 - ♦ after toilet use
 - ♦ before eating
 - ♦ before and after preparing food
 - ♦ if you are in contact with a sick person, especially those with respiratory symptoms

- if your hands are dirty
- if you have handled animals or animal waste

FACE MASKS

Using masks is unlikely to be of any benefit if you are not sick.

Sick people will be advised by their doctor when to use a mask. Healthcare workers need masks and other personal protective equipment to protect them from infection during their work
