"A SAINT IS A SINNER WHO JUST KEEPS TRING.

"The glory of GOD is the human person fully alive." St Irenaeus.

St Irenaeus lived just after the time of the Apostles and knew people who had seen and talked with them. He became bishop of Lyon, the largest trading center in Gaul, The note of moderation, the desire to win people to Christianity by love rather fear, was apparent in all of his work.

The Church is fortunate that Irenaeus was involved in many of it's controversies in the second century. He was a student, well trained no doubt, with great patience in investigating, tremendously protective of apostolic teaching, but prompted more by a desire to win over his opponents than to prove them in error.

As bishop of Lyons he was especially concerned with the Gnostics, who took their name from the Greek word for "knowledge." Claiming access to secret knowledge imparted by Jesus to only a few disciples, their teaching was attracting and confusing many Christians. After thoroughly investigating the various Gnostic sects and their "secret," Irenaeus showed to what logical conclusions their tenets led. These he contrasted with the teaching of the apostles and the text of Holy Scripture, giving us, in five books, a system of theology of great importance to subsequent times. Moreover, his work, widely used and translated into Latin and Armenian, gradually ended the influence of the Gnostics.

The circumstances and details about his death, like those of his birth and early life in Asia Minor, are not at all clear.

A deep and genuine concern for other people will remind us that the discovery of truth is not to be a victory for some and a defeat for others. Unless all can claim a share in that victory, truth itself will continue to be rejected by the losers, because it will be regarded as inseparable from the yoke of defeat. And so, confrontation, controversy and the like might yield to a genuine united search for God's truth and how it can best

His feast day June 28th and he is venerated as bishop and martyr.

LOCAL MAN INTERRED IN THE CRYPT OF THE PRO-CATHEDRAL.

On Friday June 25th, in a liturgy presided over by Archbishop Dermot Farrell, Cardinal Cullen's successor as Archbishop of Dublin, the mortal remains of Cardinal Paul Cullen were transferred from the tomb under the altar of Holy Cross College chapel to the burial Crypt of the Pro-Cathedral, Dublin.

Paul Cullen was born on 27 April 1803 IN BALLITORE, Co. KILDARE. There is a stained glass window with his image in the sanctuary of Crookstown church. He attended St. Patrick's College, Carlow and Propaganda College, Rome, where he was

ordained in 1829. He was appointed Professor of Sacred Scripture and Hebrew at Propaganda and taught there from 1829-1832 before becoming Rector of the Irish College, Rome from 1832-1849. On 8 January 1850 he was promoted as Archbishop of Armagh and was ordained Bishop on 24 February of that year. He remained at Armagh until appointed to the See of Dublin on 3 May 1852. He became Cardinal on 22 June 1866 and his motto was 'Ponit Animam Pro Amicis' - He gave his life for his friends. He died on 24 October 1878 and was buried in the grounds of Holy Cross College, Clonliffe, Dublin, which he founded in 1859.

Cardinal Cullen died in 1878 and his remains have rested under the high altar of the chapel of Holy Cross College, Clonliffe for over a century. The sale of Holy Cross College required that his body be reinterred in the Pro-Cathedral Crypt. Cardinal Paul Cullen's contribution in the nineteenth century to the fields of religious, social, educational, and church reform in Ireland was immense. He had the distinction of being Ireland's first Cardinal, Archbishop of Armagh (1850 – 1852) and later Archbishop of Dublin (1852 - 1878).

Addressing a small gathering in the Crypt of the Pro-Cathedral, Archbishop Farrell prayed: "We come together to bring the body of Cardinal Paul Cullen, my predecessor, to its new resting place. Together let us pray some Psalms that here, his body - together with all those interred in this crypt - will rest in God's safety". Requiescat in Pace. ******


